Kitao Abe of the Tokyo University of Foreign Studies, 51-21, 4 chome Nishigahara, Kita-ku, Tokyo, Japan, has been the initiator of and is the major coordinator of Japanese social and psychological studies in disasters. He has written extensively in Japan on disasters and is the author of two recent books, *How to Survive in Emergencies*, and *The Psychology of Panic*.

Thomas E. Drabek is Professor of Sociology and chairperson of the Department of Sociology at the University of Denver, Denver, Colorado 80210. He has been involved in disaster research for about a dozen years and is currently concluding some longitudinal studies of family functioning after disasters.

Russell R. Dynes is a co-director of the Disaster Research Center, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio 43201, as well as acting chairperson of the Department of Sociology at the university. His book, *Organized Behavior in Disaster*, is one of the few theoretical statements on disasters available.

James W. Kerr is the Staff Director, Emergency Operations Division, Defense Civil Preparedness Agency, and is responsible for research on preparedness matters affecting fire and other public safety forces. He is also Chairman of IAFC Research Committee, and of the NFPA Disaster (Hospitals) Subcommittee; a member of the Committee of Fire Research, National Academy of Sciences; a Fire Com-

missioner in Fairfax County; and a Defense Department delegate to the National Commission on Fire Prevention and Control. A retired army officer, Kerr has degrees in chemistry and physics and has done graduate work in Germany. He is author of the report "Incendiarism: An Overview and an Appraisal."

William H. Key is Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University of Denver, Denver, Colorado 80210. His current research interests center around the areas of urban sociology, demography and research methodology.

Kurt Lang is Professor of Sociology, and **Gladys Engel Lang** is Professor of Communications and Sociology, and both are at the State University of New York at Stony Brook.

E.L. Quarantelli is co-director of the Disaster Research Center, Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio 43201 and is currently writing a textbook on collective behavior.
